Abstract: John Eliot, 1604-1690, was a Puritan minister and translator of the Bible

into the Native American Algonquian language, originally published in 1663. His translation was the first Bible printed in North America. The collection,

gathered by Eliot biographer David Chamberlain, includes articles,

illustrations, photographs, pamphlets and correspondence related to Eliot's

work, as well as the 300th Anniversary of Massachusetts.

Biography

John Eliot, born in England 1604, studied at Jesus College, Cambridge University and graduated 1622. In 1631, Eliot traveled to New England and was ordained the following year in Roxbury, Massachusetts, where he soon became minister of the First Church of Roxbury. Eliot began studying the Massachusett language in 1646 with the help of a Native American captive from the Pequot War. This language was a highly inflected Algonquian dialect. In 1650, Eliot gathered his converts into one settlement or "praying town" called Natick, on a tract of two-thousand acres on the Charles River, eighteen miles southwest of Roxbury. Residing at this location were Nonantum, Neponset, Musketaquid and Nipmuck Indians.

Eliot spent years translating the Bible, which culminated in the publication of the Old and New Testament in 1663. Eliot's translation was the first Bible printed in North America. He continued to translate Christian literature for the Native Americans, including Baxter's *Call to the Unconverted* and other practical books; prepared an Indian catechism; Psalter; *Indian Primer*, and *The Indian Grammar Begun*.

According to the Missionary Research Library *Occasional Bulletin*, published June 25, 1958, "John Eliot's work...was assumed as the primary responsibility of the earliest organization established by Protestant Europe to work with the American Indians. It was known as the "Corporation for the Propagation of the Gospel among the Indians of New England," and was established in England in 1649."

Eliot is perhaps better known as one of the translators behind the publication of the famous Bay Psalm book, published in Cambridge, Mass in 1647.

Collection Scope and Content Note

This collection was constructed from secondary material about John Eliot and contains publications, pamphlets, and histories recounting Eliot's life and pastoral work, and general observations of the Native Americans. It includes illustrations and photographs depicting Eliot's work, as well as buildings and people from the time period. The correspondence is responses to creator David Chamberlain as he was searching for information on Eliot.

Processing

Materials were placed in new acid-free folders. Acidic items were separated from one another by interleaving with acid-free paper as needed. Preservation photocopying of newspaper clippings for retention of information was performed. Photographs were sleeved with Mylar. Collection contains one nitrate negative which was placed in acid-free paper and enclosed in an acid-free paper envelope.
