#### **Biography**

Timothy Tingfang Lew [TTL; see glossary on page 4 for other variations and Chinese characters] was an influential Protestant Christian leader during the Republican era. He taught for many years at Yenching and Peking Universities and at leading theological seminaries in the United States. As teacher, lecturer, essayist, editor, translator, administrator, educationist, and poet, he played a versatile role in the Protestant movement in China and in Chinese Christian contacts with the West.

The child of several generations of Christians, TTL was born in Wenchow in his native Chekiang province on 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1891. His mother, Liu Hsi was herself active in missionary work. TTL had two brothers and two sisters: Liu Tingfan, Liu Tingwei, Grace Hsü and Mrs. C. W. Luh respectively. Grace Hsü had at least one child, Hsü Fu-cheng, identified as TTL's nephew in these papers. TTL was married to Katherine Y.T. Lew and they had one daughter, Grace Li-en Lew.

TTL received his early education at the United Methodist College in Wenchow and at St. John's University, Shanghai. In 1910-1911 he studied in the McCallie School, Chattanooga, TN and during 1911-1913 he attended the University of Georgia, Athens, GA. He completed his undergraduate studies at Columbia University (B.A. 1914, M.A. 1915) and studied theology at UTS for two years (1915-17). He then went to Yale where he was a Fogg prize scholar, and took his B.D, Magna cum Laude in 1918. He returned to New York and obtained a PhD in

psychology and education from Teacher's College, Columbia University in 1920. In the spring of 1920 he was also ordained in the Congregational Church, Manhattan, NY.

While a student at Teacher's College, TTL assisted in the department of religious education at Union Theological Seminary, thereby becoming the first Chinese to teach a subject other than Chinese studies in an American theological seminary. At UTS he was elected to the council of the Religious Education Association in the United States. During his student years TTL was active in student organizations and served as the editor of *Liu-mei ch'ing-nien* [留美青年, *Liumei qingnian*], the quarterly journal of the Christian Association, and as associate editor of the *Chinese Students' Monthly*.

TTL's academic career in China began late in 1920, when he was appointed dean of the Graduate School at National Peking Normal College and professor of psychology at National Peking University. At the same time, he taught at the Yenching School of Religion. From 1921-1926, he was dean of the School of Religion at Yenching and assistant to the Chancellor of the University. During this period he was also honorary pastor of the Mi Shih Chinese Independent Church in Peking. Assisted by Y. Y. Tsu, Liu conducted the Christian funeral service for Sun Yat-sen at the Peking Union Medical College in March 1925.

Throughout his life TTL balanced his role as one of China's leading Protestants with that of a leading academic and administrator. He was an active participant in many international conferences and committees dedicated to the extension of Christian influence in China and in world affairs. From 1920 onward, he was a general committeeman of the World Student Christian Federation. He was also one of the organizers of the National Christian Council of China in 1922. For many years he served on the board of directors for the Peking YMCA and on the Commission on Literature of the National Committee of the YMCA. TTL also founded and edited a number of journals, the best known among these being *The Truth and Life Journal*, *The Amethyst Quarterly Journal*, and *Education for Tomorrow*.

TTL's role in the field of education was as co-founder and co-director of the Psychological Association of China. In 1923 he was made chairman of the Committee on Standardized Tests of the China Christian Education Association. In 1924 he became the first Chinese president of the China Christian Educational Association. In 1930 he was unanimously elected to the sixteen constituent bodies as chairman of the China National committee on Christian Higher Education, being re-elected in five subsequent years. TTL was also part of investigations into elementary school conditions in China and was involved in the translation and standardization of a scientific vocabulary in Chinese.

In 1926 he traveled mostly in the United States but also visited Europe. From 1926 to 1927 he lectured at Yale Divinity School, Union Theological Seminary, and Hartford Theological Seminary. In the summer of 1927 he was a delegate to the World Conference on Faith and Order at Lausanne, Switzerland, and represented the National Christian Council of China at a meeting in Germany of the World Alliance for Promoting International Fellowship through Churches. He then returned to the United States as visiting professor at Boston University. In 1928 he delivered the Enoch Pond Lectures at Bangor Seminary (Maine) and the Aldon Tuthill lectures at Chicago Theological Seminary. While in the United States, TTL received honorary

degrees from Middlebury College (D.D., 1927) and Oberlin College (S.T.D., 1927) and delivered the commencement sermon at Duke University in 1928.

In the autumn of 1928, TTL resumed his duties at Yenching and Peking Universities, although responsibilities as assistant to the chancellor at Yenching forced him to reduce his teaching commitments. It was during this time that he edited the Chinese union hymnal, *Hymns of Universal Praise*. TTL contributed many original hymns, translated many more, and supervised the editing of all. Published in 1936, this hymnal was adopted by Protestant groups throughout China and remains possibly his most notable editorial achievement. 1936 was also the year in which TTL was appointed a member of the legislative Yuan of the National Government, and for a period he maintained academic and government duties concurrently, dividing his time between Peking and Nanking. In 1937 he was a delegate from China to conferences of the meeting founding the World Council of Churches at Oxford (Life and Work) and at Edinburgh (Faith and Order), and the following year to the International Missionary Conference at Madras (present day Chennai), India. Following the Madras conference, TTL was unable to return to Peking because of the Japanese occupation of North China, and instead went to Shanghai where besides continuing his usual writing, translating and editing, he was offered a position at the Shanghai Women's University.

In 1942, due largely to worsening health and related difficulties he faced in Shanghai, TTL was invited again to the United States, where he was to remain until his death from tuberculosis five years later. During those five years he lived in the Columbia University neighborhood of Morningside Heights, New York City. TTL kept himself busy translating, writing, lecturing, and looking after his godson, George Chen. He relocated to a sanitarium in New Mexico in 1947, where he died later in the year.

TTL was a 32<sup>nd</sup> degree mason, a past Master of Rose Croix and Kadosh [?], a Shriner, and a Rotarian.

### **Collection Scope and Content Note**

This collection contains material in English and in Chinese relating to TTL's family and his writings, including the Chinese Christian Liturgy series, and administrative and professional papers and correspondence. The papers include biographical materials, correspondence, drafts of poems, articles and addresses, published poems and articles, liturgies, government and university documents, photographs, and newspaper clippings.

The collection is organized into four series:

### • Series 1: Biographical and Family, 1907-1960 (1 box, 0.25 lin. ft.)

This series contains biographical papers about TTL as well as information about his honorary degrees and some of his travels. It also contains papers relating to his family, such as a newspaper clipping of Katherine Lew's honorary LLD, reports about his mother's death, and material relating to his godson, George Chen. Family correspondence can be found in series 2 below. Two appointment letters for his brother, Liu Tingfan, are located in the horizontal box [series 4 box 2 f1]. Series 3 box 4 folder 10 contains a brief biography of TTL.

## Series 2 Correspondence, 1923-1947 (2 boxes, 1.00 lin. ft.)

This series contains correspondence with letters received by TTL as well as letters written by him. There are also letters addressed to third parties which mention or concern TTL and letters written by Mrs. Katherine Lew. The series begins with largely alphabetical organization, but from box 2 folder 3 [Business and Work related] the organization is loosely chronological. Occasional Writings and other documents may be included with correspondence just as further correspondence can also be found in Series 3.

# • Series 3: Professional Activities, 1918-1961 (6 boxes, 3.00 lin. ft.)

This series contains material related to TTL's professional activities and is dominated by his writings, including draft manuscripts, typescripts, as well as published versions of his addresses, articles, poems, and editorial works. Notable among these are the Chinese Christian Liturgy series and translation work for *A Devotional Diary*, articles and addresses on topics such as the role of Christianity in China, War-time China, and the post-war reconstruction of China. In addition, this series also includes financial papers, newspaper clippings, conference proceedings, meeting abstracts, and lists of TTL's books, documents relating to Christianity and the Church in China, appointment letters, and so on. The organization is alphabetical.

# • Series 4: General, 1915-1961 (1 box and 1 OS box, 3.00 lin. ft.)

This series includes materials such as reports, newspaper clippings, materials concerning the visit of Madam Chiang Kai-shek, and draft copies of the constitution of the Republic of China. The outsized box contains items properly belonging to other series but separated due to advanced deterioration and fragility and/or item size. Examples include business and personal correspondence in Chinese, a transportation map of China, and extremely fragile originals of journals/newspapers. Reference is made as to the proper series location of each item and researchers are directed there for consultation copies.

### **Processing**

Metal clips and staples were removed from materials and folded items were flattened. Materials were placed in new acid-free folders and boxes. Acidic items were interleaved with acid-free paper. Items in danger of deterioration were either preserved in transparent Mylar sleeves or placed in acid free inserts. In the case of the former, consultation copies exist for handling or copying purposes and in the case of the latter, fragile items should be handled with care. Items in an advanced state of deterioration were separated into acid-free inserts, marked as restricted and placed at the back of the folder. Consultation copies were made on acid-free paper and inserted into the folder order. Researchers must refer to these copies in lieu of the fragile originals.

Each consultation copy is marked with a number, letter or both (i.e., 1, 2A or A) which corresponds to the same reference on the retained originals.

To ease access, significant reorganization was necessary.

Where original MRL notation existed, these have been appended at the end of the folder title in square brackets. These notations carry a prefix of 'A' followed by three digits, and occasionally a lower case letter, e.g. [A ###a]

In 2014, the collection and finding aid were updated as part of the Henry Luce Foundation grant.
